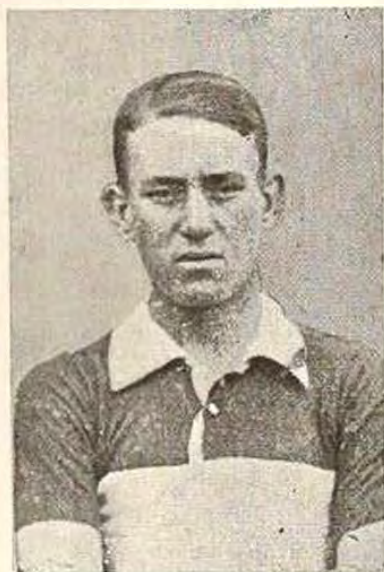

FOOTBALL.

Since the publication of the
last "Miltonian," we have en-
joyed one term of Football, from
July to September. Keen interest
was shown in the practice games
which were played on week-days.
They were arranged on the same
plan as during the previous term.
In regard to the first team
matches, however, we were dis-
appointed, for most of the rugby
players were away at the "front."
We were able, however, to arrange
one match, and that was against
the Old Boys. They were unable
to choose a strong team, and the
result of the match was a clean
"walk-over" for the school.

This term, although the cricket
season was still in full swing, the
Old Boys challenged us again,
and we played on the Queen's
Ground on Saturday, February
8th. The sun shone extremely
hard that day, and although both

sides played well at first, towards the end they were inclined to "slack." During the first half Rabinovitch, playing for the Old Boys, was the only one to score. After the interval, Townsend soon scored for the school, but after that, try as they would, the school team could not break through. The Old Boys, on the other hand, kept their "wind" better, and scored several times. F. Dreyer, who was playing full-back, deserves special credit for his good tackling, and E. Raubenheimer made some splendid runs.

Carnegie was gallantly leading on his men when he was struck by a machine gun bullet

- 1914 John James Joss, Signaller, RFA, 51st Highland Division, who was reported missing on March 21st, last year, is now reported as killed in action. Signaller Joss was at an advanced observation post with another signaller. In his account of what happened the latter states that a number of Germans came upon them and both made for their lines, but a machine-gun was turned upon them, and Signaller Joss fell. His companion managed to reach a gully, where he lay until evening, when the Germans took him prisoner. As he was marched off he passed the spot where Joss lay, and saw he had been pierced through the temple by a bullet. The late John Joss was 21 years of age and had seen two years' active service. He was at Milton from 1910—1918
- Myburgh was one of three 'fliers' who attacked a vastly superior German squadron. He was the only one to bring his machine back, but died two days later of his wounds

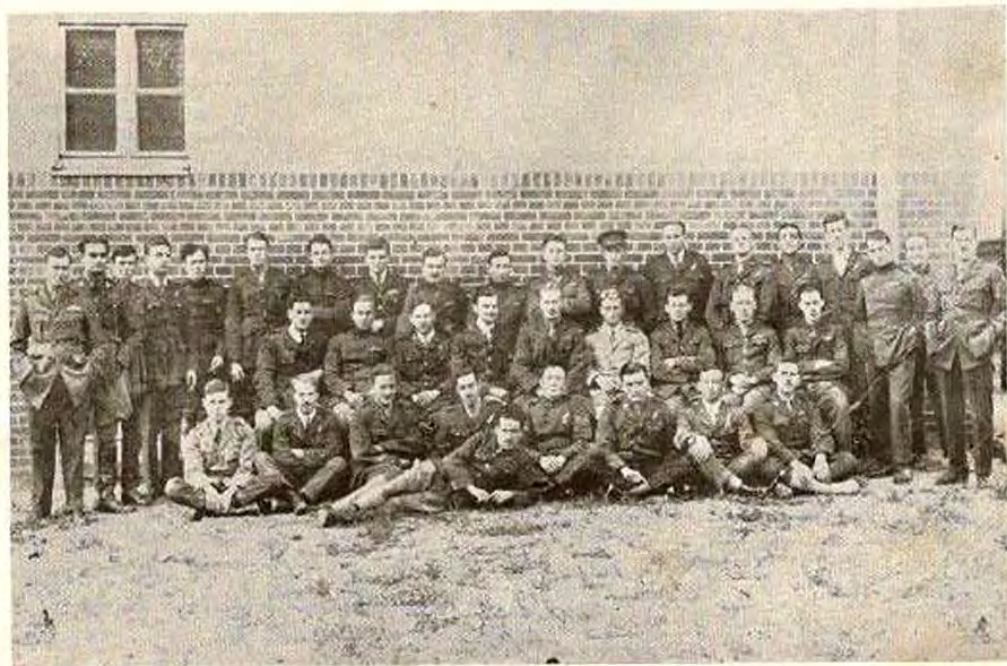
