Rugby Notes

THIS rugby season has been unfortu-
nate from one point of view. We
have had very few matches as, firstly,
after the early part of the season,
there were, due to the war, no town
teams available, and, secondly, the pre-
valence of epidemics in the country
prevented our playing many matches
against other schools, and led to the
cancellation of the Inter-School Rugby
Tournament in July.

We did manage, however, to have
two Inter-School matches, brief
descriptions of which follow.

Milton School v. Technical School

THE Technical School XV was a very good one, and were superior to us in most departments of the game, and were also bigger and more experienced. Credit is due to the very young Milton XV for the way they tried hard to the very end of the game and for their resolute tackling.

At half time the score was Technical 5, Milton 0. In the second half, the Technical School increased their score to 21 points while Milton School scored 1 try, 3 points. The game was played at a great pace and there was not a dull moment in it.

It is perhaps some consolation to us that the Technical XV, which beat us so convincingly in this match (the first round of the Honey Cup) finally won the Honey Cup—at the expense of Chaplin and St. George's—by margins quite as great as in the Milton-Technical match. We offer our congratulations to the Technical XV on winning this trophy, and also on the good rugby they played.

Milton School v. Chaplin School

WE lost this match because we played much below form and did not take advantage of our opportunities. Chaplin played well and hard, but Milton got an early 8 point lead and were content not to increase it. In the last few minutes of the game Chaplin scored a try and 2 goals and deservedly won by 13 points to 8.
