Editorial

THE number of Old Miltonians who have lost their lives whilst serving in His Majesty's Forces has unfortunately grown considerably since the last *Miltonian* was published. Among them is Capt. A. D. Campbell to whom we would like to make especial reference here because of his exceptionally long and close connection with the

School and with the School magazine, which he edited up to the outbreak of war. On a later page there is an account of his exemplary career as a scholar and a sportsman, a combination always likely to produce the fine schoolmaster, and particularly so in his case, when his profession brought him back to the classrooms and playing fields where his own schoolboy trials and triumphs were experienced.

But we should like to state how pleased the School was to welcome the Mayor of Bulawayo, Mr. D. W. Young, not only as Mayor but as an Old Miltonian, the first, in fact, to hold that distinguished office. Mr. Young made an inspiring speech, which was appreciated alike by parents and boys.

Capt. A. D. Campbell: A Tribute

ANGUS DUNDONALD CAMPBELL was known literally to every generation of boys who passed through Milton School, for he was there as a school-boy in the first years after the inception of the School, and had been an Assistant Master there since the middle of 1923 until he left on active service on the outbreak of the war.

Only 40 years of age—he was born on June 20, 1900—A. D. Campbell was the first Rhodesian Rhodes Scholar to give his life in the present war. His sacrifice is all the more tragic in that he, more nearly than any other from Rhodesia, fulfilled Rhodes's ideal for his scholars—he was an all-rounder and held high and honourable place in his chosen profession. He devoted himself wholeheartedly to the boys who came under his charge, both in the classroom and in Pioneer House, of which he was house-master for the last ten years. His instruction and example went far beyond the curriculum, and he spared no energy in cultivating the recreational and cultural needs of his pupils.

After matriculating at Milton School in 1917 A. D. Campbell was among the earliest Rhodesians to graduate at Rhodes University College, Grahamstown, where he took the B.A. degree before going on to Oxford in 1921 as a Rhodes Scholar. At Oxford he was at Hertford College at the same time as the present Rhodesian Minister of Defence, and he made full use of his opportunities there in study, travel, recreation and the corporate life of the University. After graduating with honours in English language and literature, he returned to Bulawayo joining the Milton staff in July, 1923.

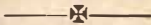
The all-round qualities which he showed at school, especially his promise in sport, flourished and developed at the University and after. Rugby and cricket were his principal games. In rugby he was captain of the B.A.C. team and also captained Matabeleland, while in 1924 he was a member of the Rhodesian team which played Dr. Cove-Smith's British team. His contribution to Bulawayo sport did not

of the people of Bulawayo for the services Mr. Livingston and Mr. Cole had rendered to Milton and thus to Bulawayo.

Miltonians had assisted Rhodesia to justify its place in the Empire. Milton had been fortunate in their headmasters. Theirs was a noble work well and truly done.

Mr. A. H. Sutherns, Education Officer, paid a tribute from the Department to one of the most distinguished scholars in the country, one who had done much to raise the scholarship standard.

Mrs. Livingston held one of the most difficult jobs in the service. She had to draw a fine line between taking too much interest or too little in the domestic side of the school and she had done this well.



Rugby Notes

THE School 1st XV consisting as it did of Dando; Hore, A., Birch, McGraw, Hore, C. (Vice-Capt.), Quinhampton; Harris, M. Milton v. Prince Edward

Won 14—3.

Played at Hartsfield.

IN this game Milton undoubtedly struck its best form and though lighter than Prince Edward played what was described as "sparkling rugby" by the *Sunday News* from which the following account of the game is taken.

"Of the three games played at Hartsfield yesterday afternoon, the best was the match between Milton and Prince Edward of Salisbury. Both sides played hard fast rugby, throwing the ball about on all possible occasions.

"The game started off with Prince Edward rushing down the field with the ball at their feet, and they only missed scoring by one forward trying to pick up the ball from the ground and by knocking on in the process. Prince Edward, however, continued the pressure and were awarded a penalty kick under the posts, enabling them to open the score. Milton had not settled down as quickly as Prince Edward, but once they did, it was obvious that their threequarters were the better of the two. They handled well and ran hard, especially their right wing Hore, C., who scored an excellent try and on another occasion cross kicked at the right moment which led to another try.

"After the first score Milton fought hard, but were losing the ball from the tight scrums. This, however, did not trouble them as they concentrated on

the loose. Their first score came from a good heal in a loose scrum. The ball travelled along the line to the right wing, who after a really good run scored. The Milton forwards worked as a pack and the threequarters were able to move fast owing to the fine service from the scrum. The wings ran well and on one occasion the left wing, Hore, A., put in a beautiful run, but when he had beaten three of his opponents he slipped, and as a result failed to score. A little later a Milton centre, McGraw, snapped up the ball and scored an opportunist try. Half-time sounded with the score 6—3 in favour of Milton.

The second half produced excellent rugby with the ball being passed about by both sides. Milton however, showed better finish. From a good three-quarter movement the right wing, Hore, C., ran well, and when about to be tackled, cross-kicked and a centre, McGraw, running up, scored. Prince Edward were playing hard resolute rugby, and on many occasions missed scoring by one of their players going offside at the last moment. Towards the end a fine individualistic try was scored by McGraw. He received the ball on his side of the half way and with an excellent run scored under the posts, making the score 14—3 in favour of Milton.

"The final whistle blew shortly after, ending a fine game—one of the most enjoyable this season."

Milton v. Technical

Lost 15—3.

Played at Hartsfield.

TECHNICAL were immeasurably heavier than Milton, and this advantage in weight told, as it always will do, in the second half of the game. Milton

did their best to open up the game, but Technical tried to make it a forward game. Milton held the territorial advantage until late in the second half, and at five minutes from "no-side" the score was 6—3 in favour of Technical. At this stage Milton failed to goal a fairly easy penalty kick and had it succeeded the result would probably have been a draw. As it was, Technical scored a goal and a drop right at the final whistle, after a game which was hard, but unproductive of good rugby, mainly because of spoiling tactics.

Milton v. Allan Wilson

ALLAN WILSON'S young and inexperienced side was no match for Milton, who gave a delightful exhibition of three-quarter play, making use of movements such as "scissors" and reverse passes, which are fairly rare in school football. Allan Wilson fought back gamely, however.

Milton v. Technical

At Milton, 1st March, 1941.—With
Candler and Smith batting well, Tech-
nical scored 50 runs before the second
wicket fell and seemed likely to make
a big score, until the ball was given to
R. Saunders, who was making his first
appearance. Assisted by the smart
stumping of C. Harris, he took 6 for
46, and Milton needed 120 to win.
While M. Harris was batting, this
seemed an easy task, but the 7th wicket
fell at 112 and Saunders and Dando
played well at this difficult period.

Milton v. Prince Edward

SALISBURY, 8th August, 1941.—Prince
Edward batted first and excellent work
by Dives, Ellis and Green left Milton
to make 175 in order to beat Prince
Edward for the first time in several
years. M. Harris and Dando bowled
accurately and at times dangerously.
Some catches were dropped, but Hill
held a remarkable one at silly mid-on
to dismiss Dives, who had been batting
faultlessly. Milton found runs hard to
get against good bowling and the skil-
ful captaincy of Green, but C. Harris,
strongly supported by C. Hore, A.
Hore and Dando, enabled Milton to
win by 3 wickets. Harris played his
best innings, taking no risks, but miss-
ing few opportunities of scoring.

Plumtree v. Milton

PLAYED at Plumtree, 14th and 15th
March, 1941.—Plumtree, batting first,
were never comfortable against C.
Hore, who was chiefly responsible for
the score being as low as 128. Milton,
however, faring little better against the
very accurate bowling of Montgomery,

were out for 144. Of this total M. Harris made 71 in an unusually restrained innings, being run out when he seemed certain to reach the century. Martin and Saunders were the only others to reach double figures, though A. Hore defended well in a 6th wicket partnership of 34. At the end of the first day, Plumtree's second innings started dramatically with the loss of five wickets for 18. Facing this difficult position on the Saturday morning, McAdam, Sanderson and Kennedy made a fine recovery for Plumtree, taking the score to 109. C. Hore again turned the ball in a disconcerting manner, and Wood bowled some dangerous overs, while both were greatly assisted by the polished wicket-keeping of C. Harris. Hill made three excellent catches at silly mid-on, Baker performed acrobatics to hold a ball in the slips, and the speedy work of C. and A. Hore saved many runs. Milton went to the wicket in a tense atmosphere with 94 to make for victory and the excitement increased when two batsmen were out for only 3 runs. But M. and C. Harris, giving the best batting display of the season, took the score to 80 before they were separated. C. Hore then joined M. Harris and the remaining runs were scored very quickly. Milton thus won at Plumtree for the first time in 15 years—a fitting end to a season in which all players worked hard and enjoyed their cricket under the able leadership of M. Harris.

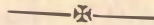
