As we celebrate the achievements of our youth today, I would like to stress that this celebration is in vain if our youth who cannot live three score and ten years.


It is my hope our youth will enjoy today's celebrations. It is also our expectation that our sons will continue to make great achievements in the real world.



The 6th Headmaster's Annual Speech and Prize giving Day Report for year 2001 presented at this year's Open Day and Open-Air Gathering.

INTRODUCTION AND PREFACTORY REMARKS:

In preparing for this morning 's address and Annual School Report, I realised eight (8) things that strike me as the watershed of the school.

- .1. This is the 6th year at this school as your headmaster and headteacher.
- 2. That the first (1st) crop of form ones, I enrolled in 1996 are this year's upper sixth form students.
- 3. That I am the 14th headmaster of this school and second African headmaster of this school in 91 years of this school's unfolding history.
- That I am the first headmaster of this school under the new management government policy of sub contracting non essential services of the school.
- 5. I am the first headmaster to preside over the localisation of the collection and use of locally of tuition fees at school level.
- 6. I am the first headmaster of this school during

which time and period the school was threatened with closure, first by Ministry of Health and Child Welfare in 1998 because of the school's delapidated buildings, the dining hall, classrooms and the hostels in particular. The second threat was the closure of the school by the City of Bulawayo local authority for the school's failure to pay the water bill which stood at \$1 million by the end of September 2000.

- 7. The first headmaster to be instructed by High Government Authority to change the name MILTON because of its colonial legacy.
- 8. And the first headmaster to insist that all teachers and government employees fo conform with the Public Service Performance Appraisal requirements, stipulation and standards.

SALUTATION AND HOMAGE

All protocol observed The Director and Master of Ceremony, allow me to thank the Chairman of the School development Association (SDA), Mr. Aaron Ngwenya for welcoming everyone of us who is here present. Good morning to you all, ladies and gentlemen and all the Miltonians. Our very special guests Dr. M N Ndubiwa and Mrs Ndubiwa, Cde. O Mpofu, the Honourable Governor of Matabeleland North, his worship the Mayor of the City of Bulawayo - City of Kings Mr J.N Ncube, Reverend Mosti, the regional Director of Education Sports and Culture and his entourage, the SDA Executive members, fellow heads of schools, members of staff teaching and non-teaching, our dear and special parents and guardians and to all MILTONIANS, teachers,

Old boys, Friends of the School, past, present, and future, comrades and friends. All protocol observed, I will now make a brief address before I present school's Annual Report for year 2001.

MILTON THE SCHOOL ON THE MOVE

In the period 1910 - 2001 so much has happened, so much has been done, said or unsaid that has had a tremendous impact and impetus to the history of the development of this school, notably its historical growth. It started off as St. John's School in 1898 to 1990 to Milton Junior School, from Eo - Ed School to Milton Senior and Eveline Girl's High School, to a school of 800, then 1400 boys from ZJC to 'O' Level then to a multi - racial school in 1990 with a student population of over 2000 to this day.

CURRICULUM GROWTH

This has resulted in the introduction of a polytechnical education, with Woodwork, Metal work, Technical graphics, Art Physical Education, Commercial Subjects being additions to the curriculum and the technicalisation and vocationalisation of the Curriculum most recently.

PRACTICAL REALISM - MAKING DO WITH WHAT IS POSSIBLE.

The school has grown in leaps and bounds. The quantum data and quantum leaps will be illustrated in the Annual Report this morning. This school as previously alluded to, from its inception in 1910 to this day and age has undergone radial and evolutionary changes in terms of:

- the curriculum it offers, with a stronger emphasis on technicalisation and vocationalisation of education putting more focus on hands on training in technical and commercial subjects.
- More emphasis in the teaching of Science and Mathematics as well as the planned introduction of Computer Science.
- Racial composition of students and teachers, which has changed drastically over the years.

The school has also experienced major breakdowns on water pumps and pipes, shortages of furniture, and the inadequacy of the school hall to accommodate the entire student population. The Dining Hall buildings are also a cause for concern.

Financial resources are very limited and over stretched over competing demands which cannot be adequately financed.

Milton High School, like its sister schools, remains a government school and as such government still indicates the management policy or framework of the school

BOMBSHELL MILTON - A Colonial Name

The School has been challenged in recent months and weeks to shed off its colonial name and the names of its two hostels - Pioneer and Charter Houses. We have been ambushed and sternly advised to depart from the colonial

names that represent the embodiment of the old order of pre-independence Zimbabwe.

The onus to change the school is on Milton High School Community and parents. The change of the name will have far reaching impacts and consequences on the history of the school, Milton Junior will have to change as well and so will Eveline High School, named after Eveline, Milton's wife.

The Milton High and Junior school community are challenged to examine the issue of the historical names associated with the colonial past. It is envisaged that the change of the name will usher the inevitable birth of a new school with a Zimbabwean Culture and a Zimbabwean orientation.

THE OUTDOOR SPEECH DAY VENUE - 2001

My sincere congratulations to the Speech and Prize Giving Day Committee and Sub-Committee for proposing a school and open day speech and price-giving day ceremony in the Open Air to accommodate the whole student population and members of the school community, friends and all the Miltonians, past, present and future. This is a departure from the past practised for over the past 21 years now when only key players like the prize winners, the prefects, selected, invited parents, a few distinguished guests and members of staff were accommodated in the School Beit-Hall which can take a capacity of 600 seated persons only. It is everybody's hope that this arrangement will be maintained now and in future.

THE SCHOOL ON THE WINDOW DISPLAY

The Milton High School annual Speech and Prize-giving day has been a tradition of this school since the school's inception. This day every year is set aside in the school's calendar to identify and celebrate each year's achievements and excellence to take stock of our short comings and success, to share our joys and sorrows and to take comfort in achievements and success with the past Miltonians, teachers and parents of the school in Zimbabwe and in the global village, admittedly and this is common knowledge, Milton High School is one of the few Government schools that has made history and continue to make history in terms of its products - human and material - both quantitatively and qualitatively, locally, regionally, internationally and globally. The secred belief which is the cornerstone of this school's success over years lies in the vision of its logo - "QUIT YE LIKE MEN BE STRONG, AND BE STRONG" AND RIZES THE (Greek for manhood).

This logo is derived from the Biblical excerpt in the Pauline book of Corinthians written by St. Paul to Christians Greeks in the face of Roman Imperialism. PLATO the Greek thinker cited bu Michael Bullivant 1985: 108 infer to three Critical components that make the complex nature of man:

1. The need for goods and services like food, shelter, and clothing.

- 2. The faculty by means of which we pursue and strenously seek to achieve our purposes.
- 3. Our capacity to think, judge, appreciate, to manage, to formulate ideas and pet standards.

These three aspects are in built in the school logo. In simple terms the school logo emphasises human excellence which embodies and embrace manhood, courage/bravery, workaholism, achievement foresight, insight perserverance and honesty. The school logo which is our school motto from a historical, philosophical and pedagogical perspective has three critical and important life time lessons which apply to all Miltonians, those who teach or work at the school, and I once more quote Bullivant 1985: 109:

- 1. "The quality by which we control and keep in their place our feelings and emotions.
- 2. "The quality by which we resist any pressures from outside ourselves which may tend to shift us from the course we know is the right one to follow"
- 3. "The quality by which we do what we know to be right"

It is against this background ladies and gentlemen, fellow Miltonians, past, present and future, and all the present that we once more gather to celebrate the achievements of the Miltonians this day. The achievements and the achievers of the school demonstrated beyond anybody's imagination or doubt the application, relevance and applicability of the school logo at this school in real terms that are measurable and sustainable. The school logo is an instrument for condensure vis-a-vis dissensions, it is the embodiment of the school's undying spirit to soldier on in the face of hiccups and pressure left, right and centre. It is an inspiration towards success not-withstanding the problems that have continued to dog the school to this day.

The generality of parents, teachers, students and community members have accepted the school logo without much a do and without conceptualising its school and beyond the school motto has no innuendos, past or present.

ENROLMENT

The school has an enrolment of 2004. The sheer size of the student population has resulted in the school's resources being stretched to limit and as it is, most facilities are run down and the school cannot afford to have these restored to normal conditions.

PAYMENT OF SCHOOL FEES AND EXTERNAL ASSISTANCE

A number of our students are receiving financial assistance for their education through the Basic Education Assistance module (BEAM) and Scholarships. No. of recipient of BEAM - - 3

Number of schoolarship holders - 5 are on Sally Mugabe foundation (Zimbabwe Child Survival and Development Foundation), 12 are on Zimbabwe Cricket Union Scholarship.

A number of our students are still in arrears with the payment of the fees and this causes a number of inconveniences as the school coffers fail to suffice.

STAFFING

The school has 75 teachers made up of college and University graduates. Of this number, 35 are male and 40 are female. The number of Graduate teachers has increased significantly with a sizeable number of teachers attaining Degree qualifications through Zimbabwe's various Universities and other through foreign Universities. Graduate teachers now constitute over 60% of the staff complement.

THE MILTON ADDRESS

The Milton Address was introduced 29 years ago in 1972 as "an appropriate way for a distinguished school to celebrate its birthday". It has been given on or about 25 July in most years since then.

The Address was intended to provide an essential element in education which can all too easily be overlooked in the routine of school life - a challenge. One of the originators of the Milton Address put it in these terms:

"We need periodically to have presented to us the challenge of the times as seen through the eyes of someone of stature within the community. There is a need for a school to reappraise its functions and its goal, to re-examine what is truly worthwhile and what is worth striving after, and for an opportunity to be provided for members to be encouraged to accept some personal responsibility for the duties of the future. Throughout time the medium of a lecture has been a source of inspiration and motivation par excellence for this purpose. We do not believe that there are not Milton scholars who might not be similarly inspired the idea is to examine those foundations on which the school - and presumably, therefore, life as well - should be erected".

The first Milton Address was given by Sir Henry McDonald, an eloquent and memorable consideration of the school's motto, St. Paul's exhortation translated in the authorised Version as "Quite you like men", and he ended with exactly the sort of challenge which the founders of the address had no doubt envisaged.

"Milton's motto is calling us all to play the man, in saying that each of us must use his or her intelligence, tuned to as fine a pitch as we can manage, to set for ourselves the highest standards we can conceive in all we do, or all we say and think, and also that we must let nothing inside us, and nothing outside us, divert us from our standards in applying what we think is right. In this way we shall truly 'be men' this is the way in which your motto calls on us to live. It is a splendid message for a great school to pass on to its pupils".

And a year later Professor Robert Craig concluded an address he called "Tomorrow's builders of the future... with a sentiment that is as relevant and vital as it was 28 years ago:

"Today every man, whether he be genius, average or even under average, black or white, is a builder of the future.... Our future lies as one nation, to the upbuilding of which all people, heterogeneous as we are, must be given the opportunity, indeed be required, to contribute according to our present and potential abilities."

Subsequent address have considered among other things "the ability to reason without fear" (R.S. Walker), conscience (the Bishop of Matabeleland, the Rt. Rev. Robert Mercer), Zimbabwe's economy and its prospects (Professor Tony Hawkins), the purpose of education (the Mayor of Bulawayo, Ald, Mike Constandinos) and constitutional reform (David Coltart). Sir Garfield Todd delivered the 75th anniversary address and since then speakers have included the former President the Rev. Canaan Banana; the Dean of Bulawayo, the Very Rev. Robin Ewbank, the British High Commissioner, Sir Ramsay Mellhuish, the Director of National Gallery, Dr. Yvonne Vera, and the Vice - Chancellor of Solusi University, Professor Norman Maphosa.

This year the speaker will be Dr. Riita Dlodlo, the City Council's Director of Health Services and she will be the most recent in a long line of distinguished people to provide food for thought in a convivial atmosphere that embraces town and gown, truly a birthday celebration worthy of Milton's great traditions

YOUNG MEN AND HIV

High and stable HIV prevalence rates are bad news. But there is worse news. Prevalence rates do not reflect the true impact of the epidemic. The 15-49 year old age group includes people who are not yet infected with HIV but who will be one day. And it excludes men and women born in 15-49 years ago who were infected with HIV but already died. If the probability that a person will become infected at any time in his life is summed up, the cumulative figure is higher than the 'snapshot' provided by current prevalence rates.

This snapshot prevalence rate among pregnant women attending antenatal care in the municipal clinics in Bulawayo last year was 30.1%. The real prevalence rate is bound to be higher, perhaps 40% or even higher.

Researchers have built models to follow people throughout their lives and examining their exposure to risks of HIV infection at each age. In general, the rate of new infections peaks among women in their early 20s and among men slightly later, and tapers off at older ages.

One such study by B Zaba indicates that if the current levels of HIV prevalence rate continue, the lifetime risk of dying from AIDS for a Zimbabwean boy aged 15 years is 70%

If the HIV prevalence rate drops by half, the lifetime risk is 50%

The corresponding figures for the neighbouring Botswana are 90% and 65%. And for example, for Kenya, 50% and 30%.

The learned audience has, no doubt, heard about similar staggering statistics before. Many of you are around 15 years of age. To think that half of you may not live to complete your tertiary studies, see your children grow up, enjoy the later years of your lives, to think that half of you may not be able to build your homes, take Bulawayo to the technology of the 21st century and to govern - Zimbabwe - is simply too traumatic to imagine.

It is also scaring to figure out how the remaining half copes with the demands of everyday life, the life that still needs to go on.

Lets now examine some of the **consequences** of one of the worst HIV epidemics in the world experienced in Zimbabwe. I'll touch on both micro-and macro level issues.

Earlier on I have already mentioned the demographic changes caused by HIV. The life expectancy at birth has and will decrease tremendously. The age-sex distribution will change since girls and young women get infected and die earlier than men. The total fertility rate will decline. The rate of natural population increase will go down from the earlier levels of around 3%. We may even face a situation where the number of deaths exceeds the number of births and the growth rate reaches levels below 0%

Socio-economically, there will be substantial loss of income leading to lesser purchasing power and savings. Health expenditure is bound to increase as families search for cure for HIV, especially when heads of households get sick. 'When money is short, families may not be able to afford to pay school fees for their children, There will be dropouts, especially among girls. And since being at school and generally gaining a better education have a protective effect regarding HIV infection, more girls and young women may acquire HIV infection.

The extended family is forced to stretch further and further as there are more orphans and fewer care givers and guardians. In a study of commercial farms in Zimbabwe it indicated that 48% of the orphaned children in primary school age had dropped out and no one orphan of secondary-school age was still at school.

In the education sector, number of qualified teachers will decrease. The class size gets bigger which may compromise quality of teaching. It is reported that Zambia lost 1300 teachers during the first 10 months of 1998. This was equal to two-thirds of the annual teacher training output.

Similar loss of professionals will affect the health sector which will face an ever increasing demand for health care services due to HIV, AIDS and related ill - health. Who is going to ensure

treatment adherence among patience to prevent development of drug resistance? Who is going to provide the counselling and testing services?

Zimbabwe has witnessed the re-emergence of tuberculosis in the last ten years. The tuberculosis notification rate which is used to be less than 100/100000 population in the 1980's has climbed up to levels of 500/100000 population. Tuberculosis is the most prevalent opportunistic infection in Southern Africa. Eighty per cent of the adult tuberculosis patients are dually infected, that is, they also have HIV. Tuberculosis is curable even if one is HIV positive. At the same time one cannot deny that the treatment outcome for immuno-suppressed TB patients can be poor and many of these communities now talk about TB1 and TB2 or two types of disease, one of which is like the one experienced during the olden times, the other often fatal.

In agriculture chronic sickness will lead to decreased productivity as time spent away from agriculture increases. Earnings will go down, households may be bound to buy basic food stuffs and overall food security will be threatened.

A study conducted in Tanzania showed a woman with a sick husband spend 60% less time in fields than she normally did. A survey published in Zimbabwe in 1998 reported that during the previous five years the output of communal maize production had fallen by 54% in harvested quantity and by 61% in marketed output. The number of hectares under cotton had decreased by 34% and the production of groundnuts and sunflowers by 40%.

There is no doubt how fundamentally HIV will hurt industry and commerce; absenteeism, lower production, higher overtime and direct cash costs, be they for covering funeral, recruitment or retaining costs. At the time it must be noted how slowly the business sector has responded to HIV epidemic in their midst even though HIV prevalence levels of 30% have been reported among many labour forces.

What can we do to prevent and control the HIV epidemic?

Globally, UNAIDS was set up in 1992 to lead the world wide HIV/AIDS control and prevention strategy. In June 2001, the United Nations General Assembly debated AIDS. This was the first time when a public health issue was given this magnitude of attention.

Regionally, some kind of a victory was celebrated a few months ago when South African court case culminated in agreement of low cost generic HIV drugs becoming available to people living with HIV and AIDS in the less developed countries.

Unfortunately, affordability may still remain a challenge. S Houston of University of Zimbabwe calculated that with an estimated 1,5 million HIV infected people in the country, using the conservative assumptions that only a third would have clinical indications for anti-retroviral treatment, of whom half could actually be reached for treatment, Lets also remember tat neither the US health insurance schemes nor the UK National Health Service could countenance providing HIV drugs at cost, to say, 25% of their populations.

Control of AIDS will eventually come through preventive medicine, vaccine today. It remains the most crucial goal in the coming years. And there is a group of some 200 scientists who work under the South African AIDS Vaccine Initiative also wishing to attain this goal.

Factors that lead to risk taking and unsafe sexual behaviour and which make all of us vulnerable to HIV infection are strongly related to the principles of human rights. Vulnerability to AIDS is engendered by a lack of respect for the rights of women and children, the rights to information and education, freedom of expression and association, the rights of liberty and security and the right to privacy and confidentiality. Promoting human rights and tolerance is thus important in fighting AIDS as well in its own right.

Some years ago I was invited to the AIDS club debate at Umzingwane High School. It was a sunny, warm day. The school hall was packed with boys and young men anticipating the debate. The topic was on the role of parents in bringing up their adolescent children - should parents talk about sex, sexually and relationships or not?

Since the invited teams from the girls school in Bulawayo had failed to grace the occasion due to the break down of their school bus I was the only lady in attendance. I was getting a bit worried. Would there be an overdose of macho behaviour? Or male chauvinism? Other expressions of perceived male sexual rights?

My worry was unnecessary. I was completely and most positively surprised by the openness and sensitivity that the debating teams exhibited and the honesty and intelligence of the discussion with the audience. I witnessed with great pleasure the results of he many years' work by - I assume - the mothers of these young men!

To date I remain puzzled what then happens to so many of fine young men who later act on basis of silly peer pressure or who become drunkards and womanisers.

Lastly, I would like to share with you, young men, a few **practical hints** about dealing with your awakening sexuality - safety and responsibility.

Be assured that there is nothing wrong with abstinence! It is not harmful to anybody's health, be it a man or a woman. Contrary to the myths rampant in this regard, abstinence is perfectly normal. To defer becoming sexually active and to abstain is a mature decision which should be encouraged and supported. Even if the whole world around you may be doing it or claiming to do it, do realise that there is no need for you to rush into sexual experimentation.

Even if some of you may already have had sexual intercourse, it is not late to consider stopping and waiting for the special person.

A time will come in your lives, when becoming sexually active is a pertinent question. Avoid just sliding into that situation - think about it in advance. Weigh the pro's and con's. Make an informed choice! Don't let your peers push you to do anything which doesn't feel right to you.

A rule of thumb: If you are not able to talk about sex, then you are not ready for it. Can you discuss it with your partner? Can you and she take responsibility for contraception? Are you HIV negative? Is she HIV negative? How do you know this? Are you able to talk about the use of condoms? Are you sober? Are you going to feel comfortable with yourself after having sex?

Remember that every person has the right to decide when, where, with whom and how to have sex. This is indeed your right. And it is also her right! That is, every girl's and woman's right.

Real man do not blackmail, coerce, demand, insist, force or use and type of violence to have sex with their partners.

Since at your age and life situation we can rarely talk about life long, mutually faithful relationships and since you will become sexually active in a high HIV prevalence area, using a condom is a must. And condoms must be used correctly and consistently - not sometimes or when one happens to remember.

Remember that sex is about intimacy, caring and loving. It should take place only between two consenting partners.

I thank the education sector and Milton High School for participating in the HIV prevention efforts. Inviting me must have been one of the many ways in which your school keeps HIV and AIDS prevention on the agenda!

Headmaster, Mr. Senda, staff and pupils, may I express my gratitude for the honour bestowed in me through your invitation to be with you today when the 91st birthday of this great school is being celebrated. Thank you very much indeed.

I am the eldest of three daughters and my parents did not hesitate to give anyone of us a chance to study as much as we wanted. By the mid seventies when I started studying in Helsinki University, already half of the medical students were female - so my choice was not too surprising to my parents. They did have a surprise of their lifetime when a certain Mr. Dlodlo entered the scene and wished to whisk their daughter away to an unknown, newly independent Zimbabwe.

I would like to recognise the grooming and coaching I have been privileged to receive over the years from the various 'mfundis of primary health care and community in Matabeleland and Zimbabwe.

And lastly, I would like to thank my Zimbabwean family for their support and understanding in my attempts to adopt the ways of this country, make a career in Zimbabwe and speak my mind even when the topic is sensitive, like today, and express my Finnish *sisu*, something which is perhaps isibindi in siNdebele and resilience in English. My special thanks go to my husband who has stood by me from the student years in Finland and years of housemanship at Harare Central Hospital to today. It has been a period of eventful and beautiful 20 years. And I am looking forward to another rewarding 20 - 30 years.

I wish all of you, and particularly the Form 4 and Form 6 school leavers, courage and strength to work towards just, dignified and caring human relationships in general and this type of relationship with the opposite sex in particular, and healthy, virus free and loving lives.





MILTON HIGH SCHOOL DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION

Chairman's report delivered at the Annual General Meeting held on Saturday, 20 October 2001 in respect of financial year - 1 January to 31 December 2000.

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 As you are already aware, ladies and gentle men, the Annual General Meeting, which had been scheduled to take place on Saturday, 25 November 2000, was aborted for lack of quorum. Only thirty-five (35) parents and guardians attended.
- **1.2** As a result your executive committee was left with no choice but to manage as best as it could. Two pressing issues, namely, BEAM, and Phase II of sub-contraction were tackled with vigour.
- **1.3** There is need to examine the needs of the school especially from a financial perspective. The critical decision will centre on money.
- 1.4 Although urgent measures were taken to arrest the dilapidation of the school, the truth is that many parts of the school continue to need urgent attention. Cases in point are laboratories, which still have gas leaks, or no gas as well as no electrical points. The swimming pool, gym and classroom are an embarrassment!

2. BEAM (BETTER EDUCATION ASSISTANCE MODEL)

- **2.1** Initially the Government issued a circular directing that BEAM committees be set up in every primary and secondary school.
 - **2.2** We compiled with this written directive.
- **2.3** After putting a great deal of directive in this exercise, the Government directed, verbally, that BEAM Committees would exist in primary schools only.
- **2.4** In our view, changes in the management of BEAM denied many deserving cases the opportunity for assistance. We submit that approximately twenty (20) to thirty (30) boys deserved assistance at Milton High.
- **2.5** From the preliminary interviews we conducted before Government changed its plan, it was evident that AIDS has left many grandparents with several orphans to look after.
- **2.6** Unlike the AGM, which failed to materialise for lack of a quorum, the initial BEAM meeting was well attended. The Beit Hall was full.

3. SUB-CONTRACTING: PHASE II

- **3.1** Plans for the sub-contracting of Catering Services were put in place.
 - 3.2 This exercise was completed in early 2001

4. FINANCIAL FACTS CONCERNING SUB-CONTRACTING

- **4.1** Government funding amounts to only \$177 000,00 per month.
 - **4.2** Salaries alone amount to \$402 138,00 per month.
- **4.3** Cleaning materials cost an average \$150 000,00 per month
- **4.4** Government funding shortfall amounts to \$375 138,00.
- **4.5** When sub-contracting started, Government promised us a profit margin of 10%. The reality on the ground is an in-built loss to the SDA.
- **4.6** A letter was written to the Ministry requesting that the amount paid by Government be increased. We have not yet received a reply.

5. DEBTORS

- **5.1** The sum of \$940 491,40 was recovered in the year 2000.
- **5.2** Although this report does not cover the year 2001, I am pleased to inform you that \$1 031 751,04 was recovered during 2001.
- **5.3** Mid Sec was tasked to collect \$1 339 000,00. \$45 000,00 has been received from Mid sec.
- **5.4** Members of the staff from the English Department have recommended the use of a card system, which can be shown to teachers to indicate student status in terms of levy and other payments. This recommendation reached me late, however it is recommended that teachers who made this recommendation be asked to attend the next Executive Committee meeting in order to clarify their recommendations.

6. LEAKING UNDERGROUND PIPES.

- **6.1** Leakage of water resulted in water bills of over \$1 000 000,00.
 - **6.2** Sewerage pipes also need constant repair.

6.3 These 'unforeseen' problems make budgeting difficult since we are forced to react to crises.

7. ADVANCED LEVEL SCIENCE EXAMINATIONS

- **7.1** In the year 2000, 46 students sat for 'A' level science examinations at a total cost of \$350 000,00.
- **7.2** The Ministry of Education, Sport and Culture has indicated that if we want the 'Principle of User Pay' to apply, parents have to approve special levies such as s science levy for 'A' Level Candidates.
 - **7.3** The ramifications of such a levy are as follows:
- **7.3.1** Students doing science will bear the cost instead of being subsided by the parents of students not doing science.
- **7.3.2** Large funds that have hitherto been spent on a small minority can be used for maintenance, learning resources or development to the benefit of the majority of students.
- **7.3.3** Students from poor families will not be able to study science even if they have an aptitude for science. This will be bad for the individual concerned and the society at large.

8. COST OF SPORTING/CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

To ensure that sporting and cultural activities do not detract from the development trust, it is proposed that a sport levy of \$80,00 per term be charged.

9. PRACTICAL SUBJECTS

There is need to similarly have a special levy to meet adequately the needs of students practicals. It is proposed to have the levy of practical subjects set at \$250,00 per term.

10. STAFF MATTERS

- **10.1** I regret to inform you that two employees of the SDA, Messers Adam Ndlovu and Calvin Mudzanirwa died.
- **10.2** The SDA assisted by paying \$3000,00 towards funeral expenses. The SDA also provided the Mazda Pickup truck for the purposes of carrying the bodies to Kezi and Gutu respectively.
- 10.3 In the light of sub-contracting, it is necessary for the SDA to brace itself for wage increments in respect

- of all its employees. The SDA has both moral and legal obligations to ensure that its employees earn realistic wages that will sustain their families.
- **10.4** The portion paid by Government towards subcontracting is likely to continue shrinking until it vanishes from sight altogether.
- **10.5** In the light of this fact, the SDA should adopt a proactive stance and be certain to meet any eventualities that are bound to emanate from wage increases.
- 10.6 After auditing our accounts, auditors expressed the view that salaries given to our office staff were too low considering the monetary responsibility they carry. Furthermore the office staff did a sterling job in recovering debts. In the light of these observations, It is recommended that the incoming executive should increase the pay of the office staff. The last two audits were not qualified. This indicated sound performance. We are grateful to parents with an accounting background who made suggestions that resulted in this improvement.
- 10.7 There are certain weaknesses in terms of cus tomer care, human relations and public relations, which need immediate and constant attention if good results in performance are to be achieved by SDA office. These and other weaknesses will be brought to the attention of the new executive in the presence of the office staff at the time of hand-over-take-over. Sweeping these weaknesses under the carpet is certain to create problems for the new Chairman and new Executive as well as the SDA. The principle of 'experts being on tap and not on top' should be observed.
- 10.8 The Librarian who had done a very fine job left abruptly for greener pastures. Without adequate remuneration we cannot keep good librarians for long. The library needs another person to assist the librarian on a daily basis. Library effectiveness and efficiency cannot be achieved without adequate human resources. In addition to low pay, I believe that the heavy work load had a bearing on the departure of the librarian.

11. CLASSROOM FURNITURE

To avoid having furniture crises it will be necessary to purchase 300 desks and 300 chairs in the not too distant future. The estimated cost is \$540 000,00.

12. OFFICE EQUIPMENT

- **12.1** At this point in time, the school is faced with a crises because both the photocopier and copy printer are not functioning. This equipment is now obsolete.
- 12.2 At the same time, the school needs a personal computer and printer. Without this equipment, school administration, teaching and examinations are difficult to conduct. Photocopying done outside the school is very expensive.

13. LIBRARY RESOURCES

\$500 000,00 is needed for the purchase of library resources.

14. GENERAL LEVY

To meet the needs of the school in terms of running costs, repairs and maintenance and staff wages, the Executive Committee requests that the general levy be increased from \$500,00 per term to \$4 000,00 per term (See budget)

15. SPECIAL PROJECT LEVY

For the purpose of purchasing the following office equipment:-

- **15.1** Computer and printer
- 15.2 Fax Machine
- 15.3 Copy printer
- 15.4 Photocopier

It is proposed that a one off special levy of \$3 000,00 be charged. Ideally this should be payable by March 2002.

16. BUS

- **16.1** Payments for the bus are almost over. We are left with one installment of \$192 000,00, which should be paid in January 2002.
 - **16.2** The amount paid to date is \$3 401 711,19.
 - **16.3** Current quotations for a similar bus are at least \$6 000 000,00.

17. SPECIAL PROJECT

- **17.1** There is urgent need to build a new complex comprising:-
- **17.1.1** Six (6) classrooms
- **17.1.2** Two (2) laboratories and a purpose built Computer centre and,
- 17.1.3 A standard library.
- **17.2** This project could be done in three phases as shown in 16.1, above.
 - 17.3 At this juncture, it is suggested that the incom-

ing Executive Committee be mandate to arrange for the design of the complex as well as thoroughly examining the modalities of financing the special project.

17.4 Among factors to be considered is the need to blend the new complex with the existing buildings. To save space, a two-storey building should be considered. Needs of the disabled should also be taken into account. The proposed complex can be built on a site that is currently occupied by a condemned building.

18. ACHIEVEMENTS

Your Executive Committee achieved the following:-

- **18.1** Getting \$500 000,00 for science from the City Council.
- **18.2** Solved the furniture crises.
- 18.3 Repaired classrooms
- **18.4** Provided books and stationery items.
- **18.5** Attended to plumbing and electrical repairs.
- **18.6** Purchased a bus.
- **18.7** Lobbied the Ministry with the result that the Ministry made repairs to the tune of \$1 243 000,00

19. STATUTORY INSTRUMENT REQUIREMENTS

- 19.1 Your SDA Executive is aware of the provisions of Statutory Instrument 70 of 1993. Generally the levy should not exceed one and a half (1,5) times the tuition fees.
- **19.2** However, the conditions and needs of our school require monetary resources well above that which could be obtained within the limits of the said instrument.
- **19.3** In making your decisions please bear in mind the unique and special circumstances faced by Milton High e.g. water bills which of late have reached over million dollars due to old-age piping.
- **19.4** It is important to note that parents are not allowed to authorise a levy above the statutory instrument, provided the situation warrant this.

20. NEGOTIATIONS BETWEEN THE SDA AND REGIONAL OFFICE/MINISTRY OF EDUCATION.

20.1 After intense and persistent lobbying which included writing to the Ministry of Education, Sport and Culture, a meeting attended by the then Acting Regional

Director, the District Education Officer (Bulawayo South), the Headmaster, the Chairman of the SDA, two Committee members and two representatives of the Old Miltonians, it was agreed among other things that:-

- **20.1.1** The condition of the school was unsafe and could lead to serious injury and even fatalities, especially in laboratories and workshops.
- **20.1.2** There were problems concerning the conducting of science experiments due to gas leaks or non-availability of gas.
- **20.1.3** That the extent of dilapidation was beyond the present financial capacity of the SDA.

21 DECISIONS TO BE MADE

This meeting ladies and gentlemen needs to make decisions concerning the following:-

- **21.1** Proposal to increase the general levy to \$4 000,00 per term. This decision will affect everyone.
- **21.2** Proposal to establish a special levy for students studying science subjects at 'A' level. This special levy will affect students doing science subjects only. The over whelming majority will not be affected. The science levy requested amounts to \$3 000,00 per science subject per annum at current prices.
- **21.3** Proposal to establish a sports levy of \$80,00 per term. This levy will affect all students. However like the science levy it will allow the general levy to benefit a majority of students.
- **21.4** Increase the levy for practical subjects to \$250,00 per term. Again this will release the general levy funds for maintenance, learning resources and development. Only students doing practical subjects will pay. The teaching of practical subjects will improve because learning resources will be easier to get.
- 21.5 Choose a new Executive to run the affairs of the SDA. Ladies and gentlemen, you will be wise to choose people with commitment, integrity, leadership potential, courage, managerial skills and the ability to win the support of significant community groups.

22 THANKS

Ladies and gentlemen, I would like to conclude my report by thanking all members of the Executive Committee:-

- **22.1** for sensing, warning and taking concrete steps with regard to the crisis emanating from the condition of the school.
- **22.1.1** For their unity and courage in standing up for what was correct.
 - 22.1.1.1 For the trust they placed in me as I exer-

cised leadership in very difficult times.

- **22.2** My thanks go to the staff and pupils who constantly encouraged me each time we made progress. This appreciation, more than anything else, sustained my spirit during dark moments.
- **22.3** I must also thank, from the bottom of my heart, the Headmaster, Mr A.B.S. Senda for his hard work, vision and determination to restore Milton High to a condition of excellence in all respects.
- **22.4** Last but not least, I would like to thank my wife who has been a teacher at this school since 1985 and all my children for supporting me wholeheartedly.

23. FAREWELL

As I say farewell to you all, I wish you every blessing in your efforts to improve the condition of Milton High School. I also wish you success in your endeavours to purchase office equipment as well as establishing a new complex comprising of classrooms, a computer centre, laboratories and a standard library. These are critical for providing educational experiences that are in line with a world that is dominated by technology, information, industrial and commercial enterprise.

Mr Headmaster Honoured Guests Fellow Athletes

It was indeed a surprise, but considerable honour to be invited by my Old School to address you at this important inaugural event. I am greatly impressed that functions such as these have arranged, and hope that they become an annual event on the school calendar, for whilst schools are primarily centres for academic achievement, they are also centres for sport.

With so many disciplines here tonight, I am sure that individuals do not want to hear a recitation of my hockey involvement, and consequently I would like to speak briefly about essential elements of sport. I also want to recall an important moment in Milton and Zimbabwe's past that I believe has a message for us today.

I was a pupil at Milton in 1978 when segregated schools were abolished. I recall the apprehension faced by boys of all colours as they first met one another - but more clearly recall that once on the athletic track or rugby field, colour nolonger played a part. We were Miltonians, and we supported the school colours no matter who was wearing them. This is how our national sport should be and from my experience it is very much so. Sadly however, today politicians choose to ignore this history, and seek to divide us among the lines of colour. I believe that we must resist this. Here at Milton we have proved the fallacy of this teaching, and we must reject it again. Colour does not play a part on any sports field, and Milton has clearly demonstrated this. Sport can and should be a powerful nation building force - if encouraged and managed fairly.

At schools level we are able to compete on the international arena, it is only when professionalism, resources and money are brought to the game after school that we in Zimbabwe battle to achieve honours. That is not to say that it can't be done, the fact that we compete successfully at schools level is an indication that we have a talent. the individual achievements of numerous Zimbabean sportmen and women testify that this country can be a world sports force, but there is clearly something missing. I believe that we lack any kind of government policy towards sport. For example, sport no longer plays the role in education that it did when I was here at Milton. It saddens me greatly to see that Milton has half the playing fields than when I was at school, but nearly three times the number of boys. Clearly sport is no longer an essential part of the schools environment, but if it is not, then where do you learn about team spirit, group co-operation, sportmanship and other vital social skills? I call on government to revisit the role of sport in the school curriculum, to provide the requisite resources to ensure the

growth of sport at school, and to support the teaching staff who are responsible for sport.

Beyond school, the Sport and Recreation Commission fails in its role in promoting the national sports ethos. It is concerned more about commercialism than promotion of sport. Until we follow the example of countries such as Australia, who twenty five years ago set out to achieve world excellence, and committed themselves to win more Olympic Gold Medals than they did in their disappointing 1976 Montreal Games, we will continue to witness the poor results we see on the fields of play all to often. I believe that this is the core function of the Sports and Recreation Commission and we spotmen and women need to press for this role.

Even where world class facilities exist, such as the National Aquatics Centre, or the outstanding Hockey Stadia, government fails to provide either for ongoing maintenance and management, or for programmes that allow scholars, such as Milton schoolboys, from having access to these facilities. Nowhere else in the world do facilities become as neglected as they are here - nor are they administered with no governmental assistance. Government has to change its perception of sport, it needs to invest seriously in the games if we are to see any kind of change in our fortunes. The success that we have had has been through the efforts of individuals without goernment assistance. Byron Black owes his success not to any kind of government promotion, but to his late father's determination and financial support and this kind of example is replicated throughout the various sports in Zimbabwe.

I was saddened to read that the Zimbabwe Open Golf Tournament just ended in Harare was a reflection of the event that was staged some years ago. I know that in the hockey world we had to withdraw both our National Men and Women from the World Cup Qualifiers this year, due not so much to the difficulty of fund raising, but to the fact that no bank could assure of foreign currency. We are the only country in African Hockey where Government provides no assistance to the National Team - and hockev is not unique in this aspect. The Ministry of Education and Sport along with the SRC need to become more proactive and supportive of Zimbabwe Sport. Right now all our sport is suffering greatly from the very difficult situation that prevails in the country. Without certainty we cannot plan the future, countries are not prepared to visit us, and we certainly can't travel. In effect we are playing under a form of sanctions, and our various sports are playing the price.

However, beneath the pall of doom, there are significant positive signs and we need to focus on these. When I travel abroad for Zimbabwe Hockey, I meet with tremen-

dous goodwill towards the people of Zimbabwe. We still have the finest climate for sport - and we do enjoy world class facilities in most disciplines. Our youngsters compete successfully against South Africa and other countries, and certainly in hockey, we are seeing a growing base in the game in areas that have never had access to sport previously. Players remain comitted and positive - this is vital to the future of any sport. The very fact that sport has not collasped is testament to a future - we need to ensure that when our national fortunes improve that we are ready for the challenge. And that means investing in the youth of today. Events such as this, this evening, also play a part in keeping sport alive, and of keeping the flame burning. This is a positive event and so must be continued.

Gathered today this evening are Zimbabwe's future stars. Those of us here tonight, Old Miltonians who have had a moment of national glory in the past, owe it to those youngsters to ensure that they have a chance tomorrow. We need to engage our Old School more closely and provide the support that is required. I extend sincere appreciation to those who assisted with organising this event. I believe that Milton has a lot to offer Zimbabwe Sport. We have provided more than our fair share of national sport stars, both on the field and administratively. This may be due to the fact that our school motto so well serves all sportsmen and women.

The Geography Department is one of the biggest in the school as it is a compulsory subject offered in Form one to four and there are two classes in each lower sixth and upper sixth forms. The department has seen changes in leadership since the depature of a long serving Head of Department Mrs T.E. Khumalo at the end of 2000. Mrs C.Dube had a term's stint then proceeded on promotion as lecturer at United College of Education. Mrs B.G. Dube then took over the running of the department in term 2.

Mr R. Moyo from Manama High School replaced Mrs C. Dube while two new teachers, Mr N. Khumalo and Miss N. Vellah were shared with the Ndebele Department. Mrs M.N. Mukahana also replaced Mr Mugadza. The department is adequately staffed with qualified and experienced teachers. The department has thrived to maintain high academic standards through team work and promotion of uniformity in implementation of Departmental Policies. There was a slight drop in both 'O' and 'A' level results in 2000.

1999 2000 'O' level 47,0% 41,8% 'A' level 87,5% 72%

It is becoming more and more difficult to recover and replace text books from the boys. The department has

produced a list of reccomended books per form which will be provided by parents. The Department hopes to organise educational trips which will enhance the pupils knowledge of certain aspects in Geography. Geography students are also encouraged to join the conservation club so that they can gain more exposure to practical ways of sustaining the environment.

The first year of the new millenium did not favour History 'O' level students at Milton. We realised that we had been insufficiently briefed on the new look format of the Cambrige 'O' level paper and the results reflected this. Of the 205 students entered 73 passed and 132 failed giving us a pass rate of 35.6% compared with 0.9% in 1999. The History Deaprtment scored only 3 'A' grades as compared with 39 in 1999.

We prepared 31 students for 'A' levels which is a considerable number. In 2001 we are preparing, we had a 63% pass rate in 2000 compared with 69% in 1999. We had 3 students who achieved 'A' grades in 2000 which is no mean feat.

In the staffing department we were very sorry to lose Mrs Duhwa to the Commerce Department. Our loss indeed for Mrs Duhwa has served us very well for a number of years. Mr C. Moyo came in her place but was in turn replaced by Miss C. Moyo in the 2nd term. As Shakespeare said "What is in a name." Mr C. Phiri left to join Hillside College and Mr Masuku replaced him taking a mixture of P.E and History classes. Mr Masuku left in the 3rd term to join Gwanda Teacher's College and Miss Zulu came in place. Mr Manda went on a half term's leave and Mrs Mushaninga and Miss Zulu took Mr Manda's classes between them. We wish all our new Miltonians happy History Teaching.

Mr Runesu took over from Mrs Evans as Lower VI Histroy teacher. Our entire 2000 allocation of \$20 000,00 was used to buy new text books for LVI 'A' level text books are

now prohibitive in cost. Text books and their loses are our biggest head ache as costs continue to rise we must do our utmost to recover our text books at the end of each year, but each year we fail to recover approximately 5-10 textbooks per class.

This coming year 2000 will see parents of new form one students being asked to supply their own text books. In conclusion students remember that History follows a circle and not a straight line. What you learn from the past helps you to see into the future.

We would like to thank Mr O. Gwebu, Mrs Mukombe, Obert Dube and the school for all the support given to us. God Bless.


