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### Women's Lip

What is your opinion on the manners and behaviour of the boys at Milton? "Generally, Milton boys are quite well behaved and have good manners, although they sometimes have to be reminded of them! Rhodesian youth is way shead of youth in many other countries in this respect."

"I think that mammers and behaviour could be a lot better - I would like to see more of the little courtesies of life being practised - opening doors, greeting lady teachers, etc. I think that the VI Form are particularly remiss in this respect. I har far too much bad language and the habit I hate most is spitting! Disgusting!!"

"Individually and in small groups their manners and behaviour are/is good. Assembled in the Beit Hall they display no decent manners and their behaviour is disgraceful."

"Could be more considerate."

Do you find boys more eager to work than girls? "No, very few boys seem to be eager to work and those that do come in for such a ragging from the others that they soon abandon any enthusiasm. Girls are far more competitive and keen to please."

"By and large, girls are more conscientious."

"No."

"Some, but not all. Girls seem to realise that they have to work very hard to get anywhere. Some boys do as well, but most are very casual and could do far better if they were prepared to work.

What methods do you use to keep order in your class?

"A bit of yelling, a bit of sarcasm (much appreciated by those not under fire), and a bit of beating, usually by me, but more serious cases go to the Head..

Occasionally I set extra work. Generally, I don't find discipline a problem. "

"I try to keep my classes busy and interested. A class that enjoys lessons is generally well behaved. I keep the class good humoured and prefer to coax them along using fair repartee and keeping my wits just that little bit sharper than theirs. I use the tried methods of lines and extra work in the last resort, I send a boy to be beaten, but very rarely, and for something very serious."

"Natural authority."

"Iron hand in velvet glove, or single out a rowdy boy."

"A spoken word. A well timed rebuke can humiliate a cheeky boy, and a short lecture can pull up a class. Occasionally beating has to be a last resort - by the Headmaster, not by me!"

"Give them jobs to do such as clean the classroom, etc."

# Do you think female teachers should receive the same salary as male teachers?

"Yes! Definitely! We do exactly the same job (often much more conscientiously!) It is sexual discrimination to pay us less. We are one of the last countries in the world where this rule still applies."

"Yes! We are expected to do the same job - take sport and have the same qualifications. Besides, women teachers work much harder in and around the classroom, preparing lessons and marking books. Women are natural teachers - men have to learn to be!"

"No."

"Why not? Equal pay for equal work? Men's married responsibilities should be met by family allowances, or some such, depending on whether population-growth seems lesirable or not. Who decides this latter point?"
