The Prefects Seminar

The Prefects Seminar took place on the 18th. Jan. in the Jubilee Pavilion. It is an annual meeting which deals with the prefects and their duties & responsibilities. This year there were again 3 speakers, Stephen McKenna speaking on "The Aims of Prefectship", Michael Hill speaking on "Qualities of Leadership" and Andrew Buchan on "The Place of Rules in School Society".

The object of the seminar is for the prefects to get to know what is expected of them, for them to get to know and understand people and to discuss things that need to be altered. The basic format is that of three speeches on specific topics.

Once one of the topics has less opened by a speaker, the prefect body splits up into three groups, each

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group discussing with one of the masters present, their own particular views. Each group has a scribe who reports back to the whole body after the groups have reassembled.

This year, as you already know, the theme is "Discipline"; members of the prefect body will have to enforce discipline where they believe it to be necessary and important. However, the prefect body would prefer to call a boy to the common room to congradulate him, rother than to discipline him!

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Sixth Form General Studies - Talk about the Samaritans.

1979's general studies got off to a somewhat unusual start when Mr. Paddy McCarthy came to address the sixth form, about the work the Samaritans do. He explained that the organisation has formed by the Nev. Chad Varah in the mid 1950's in an attemp to do something constructive about the increasing suicide and diverce rates and to help with social problems and pressures in general. The basic principles are confidentiality and anonymity - many people find it easy and helpful to pour out their troubles to an unseen listener to when they do not have to reveal their identity: wherever possible the Samaritans de follow-up work, but always in the strictest confidence.

Although the name Samaritans is taken from Christ's parable of the Good Samaritan, Mr. McCarthy stressed that the organisation is in no way linked to any religious denomination; of the four Bulaunyo directors, one is an Atheist, one a Jew, one a Catheria and one an African. The Bulawayo group numbers approximately 80 and every hour of every day someone is available to answer the phone at 65000. The Samaritans deal with in excess of 800 cases each year and of these, some 15% ar very serious problems as opposed to temporary worries. There is a lighter side - Mr. McCarthy told the story of practical joker who attempted to convince a credulous Samaritan that he was

actually phoning in the midst of a suicide attempt on top of Southanpton House!

Mr. McCarthy concluded by explaining the value of the Samaritans' work and pointed out that the organisation was funded entirely by donation; in that connection, there was to be a flag day on Saturday 3 March and he had hoped that, if asked, some Miltonians would be willing to help with this; we are certain that he can be assured of as much support as he night require.

Old Miltonians Reunion

On Saturday February 3rd. we are holding the Old Miltonians Reunion, an annual event. There will be a cricket match against the Old Boys starting at 9,30am. and in the afternoon it is hoped to have a social tennis match between the School and Old Boys. In the evening there will be a sundowner and supper in the povilion.
